I felt like I had walked into a bad April Fool's joke. This falls under the category of, who knew?

If you want to put the BH&R on backs or borders of quilts, you must think in yardage. 2-3 yards for borders (depending on size of quilt) and 5-10 yards for backing. You may want to make curtains, pillow cases, purses, skirts, chair covers, pillows, aprons, napkins, t-towels.

Call me and let me know approximately how much yardage you want. I have started taking payments now with any pre order. Fabric should arrive in late June, in time for traveling tourists. Just so you know. Price will be \$12.50 per yard.
