Please indulge me with my Spain stories. I'm writing for me, so I can remember, but I'm also writing for my singing friends that I met on this trip, with the hope that some of my experiences resonate with them.

When you travel you have to be ready for anything, especially when it comes to hotel rooms. For example....

Our hotel room in Barcelona. First off, we arrived at the hotel around 10 a.m. Our room didn't become available until 3:40. Our first rehearsal was at 4. Now, late hotel rooms aren't unusual, but the check in process was a bit tedious, and we encountered lines again--remember these are stories about Spain and lines, not necessarily in that order. To be fair, we had about 100 people to check in, 2 clerks & no rooms yet cleaned. Finally our tour coordinators stepped in, put room keys in envelopes & started calling out names. Unfortunately, the first people to get rooms were the singers who were still stuck in New York. Toward the end, Heidi & I started bidding on rooms. Not necessarily showing our best behavior, but we were a bit tired. We were willing to take anything.

Now, this hotel had recently been retrofitted. For example, we think the hotel pool was reoriented to the roof from the main floor, and the pool space was turned into a breakfast/lunch area with a "top" that looked a little like the Denver airport canopy. You could look down on the breakfast room/former pool from the windows on each floor, like a courtyard surrounded by rooms. To get to the pool, you had to go down to the lobby, around the corner to a different elevator and then up to the 8th floor. Slightly strange, but worth the effort. The rooftop pool had great views, a constant breeze, a bar, food, and, of course, refreshing water for cooling off.

The room itself was fascinating. You had to stick your key card into the light switch to activate most of the lights. That took a trip to the front desk to figure out because remember the lines? no one answered the phone at the front desk. And, of course, I had to stand in line to ask my question.

Each room had a safe, but no key. You had to get the key from the you got it, the front desk. And, the hotel had not made enough keys for all of the safes. You had to wait for someone to turn in a key. We never got a key. You could use the safe at the front desk, butdid I mention the lines?

The room itself had 2 useable outlets for plug ins, and none by the beds. And of course, we're Americans with a minimum of 2 things that have to be plugged in every night. Heaven help the business person or Japanese tourist (only other nation more

obsessed with electronic devices) with a cell phone, a computer, a tablet and ipod-times 2 or 3 people to a room. And there was no "quick" charging anything. It took a good 8 hours to get a 50% charge on my tablet--important because that is where my music was.

Now the beds were interesting. They were on rollers and shoved together in the middle of the room. There was one long stretched-across-the-bed, pillow, and one, small pillow, stuffed into a vinyl cover. It took us two days to figure out that we could unstuff the small pillow. Until we figured that out, we were tempted to steal pillows from the lobby. We generally folded the other pillow in half for sleeping or a back pillow for sitting up in bed. But if you put the pillows behind your back, and leaned against the head of the bed, the bed, which was on rollers, rolled away. For an extra pillow, I took one of the heavy blankets, kept it folded, and put it under my knees for a prop. I think we mystified the cleaning crew as to what we were doing with all of this.

The bathroom was interesting, too. My first venture in the shower was very scary. The tub was high, no handrail on the outside of the tub, and no sticky things on the bottom of the tub. And the tub sloped precariously. Gave me nightmares and I was about to brave the lines at the front desk & ask for a bath matt, until I decided to just use the terry cloth floor matt in the tub. The hand towel then became the floor matt. Worked like a charm. I'm not sure they ever dried out between shower visits. And speaking of towels, there were no wash cloths provided. I'm guessing mold & mildew figured into that choice, but if you didn't bring your own scrubbie you just had to function with a little tiny bar of soap. And we had one glass each, to hold the toothbrush.

And another thing-there were no drawers. There were a couple of shelves, but you couldn't hide anything in drawers. You know me. You've seen the classroom at the shop. I'm kinda all over the place. If I have a drawer, I can stuff everything inside and the room will look neat. Without drawers, it's like rooming with a 2-year-old: music, knitting, sewing, pens, journal, phone, tablet, pencil box, postcards, souvenirs, books, food scattered & piled everywhere.

But we did have a very big window, with some ledges that we could hook hangers onto. And a sill underneath, all of which functioned as a clothesline. We checked & from the street you could see our laundry hanging from the windows. It took about 2 days to dry and I think I might have been better off wearing sweated tops vs mildew smelling tops.

And for the classiest touch of all, the room had 2 numbered paintings/drawings on the walls. Not your ordinary wall art from Hobby Lobby for decoration.

All in all, after all of our modifications, the room became home for us for 10 days. And check out? No lines.

Northcott has collaborated with the Pony Express Museum in St. Joseph Missouri to create a fabric collection that honors this unique part of American history! The collection includes authentic replicas of artwork from the museum.

There is also a Pony Express pin with coordinating charms for each of the 8 states along the Pony Express route. We do have the pins, but they won't be available until 1) either I get back, so August 1, or 2) not until September when the Pony Express Event actually starts. I think I can sell the charms as soon as I get them, but I will keep you posted. There are a lot of rules.....


PONY EXPRESS QUILT CHALLENGE

From Northcott: Pony Express: More panels of the map are coming next week.

























From Northcott: We also got twinkle light for the panels & we'll show you how they work, after we've figured it out.










































ROW BY ROW!
