### December 15, 2017

Sometimes we're not happy unless we have something to complain about. And I'm not talking about Washington politics. Complaining about D.C. politics doesn't make anyone happy.

No, I'm talking about the weather. In Wyoming I think we take intense pleasure complaining about the weather. Like the wind - witness the 18 semis that blew over a couple of weeks ago. For those of you not from here, it was breezy that morning, but not that windy. Until about 9:30 or so. I noticed the wind had picked up when I was going through the drive thru at Arby's. It wasn't until after I got to work that I heard about the blow overs and the interstate closure. I think the wind came up strongly and quickly, taking everyone by surprise.

We love to tell tourists who complain about the wind on "windy" days that Wyomingites don't notice the wind until it gets past the breezy stage-or about 50 mph. And even then, that's normal wind. Wind that blows over

We tell stories to tourists about the wind, and coach them on how to park the car so the car door doesn't either slam on your legs when you get out or the door doesn't snap its hinges when the wind catches it. We proudly explain why most of the double doors at businesses only allow one door to open. Wind. We're happy to complain about it. Even giddy. We'll talk over each other just to tell an even worse wind story.

Other weather we complain about is the cold. Okay, that technically is not weather. But when it gets below zero I think it counts as weather. We also complain about the snow-we either have too much or too little. Or it's blowing sideways or you can't see through it (blizzard) or it's too wet (heavy & soon to become ice) or it hasn't melted much so now it's dirty.

We also tell stories about wicked winter snow falls. We relish telling these stories. They fall into the tall tale stories our parents once told about having to walk a mile to school, uphill each way. We love these stories. Valdez, Alaska, this week has a great snowfall story: an amazing 15 feet of snow in 90 minutes. Go to see the new Star Wars movie & come out and you can't find your car, let alone drive anywhere. But it didn't happen here, unfortunately. We can't complain about it.

It's harder to complain about the weather in the summer. We have beautiful summers. But we do complain that it's too hot, or too cold, or too dry. We also get horrific hail storms so we proudly exchange stories on how bad my house got hit, hoping it was much worse than your house. It's great.

I can't imagine living somewhere where the climate is even: not too hot, not too cold, not too rainy, not too dry. A Goldilocks' kind of place. And I'm getting worried that Cheyenne might be turning into such a place. We've had such a nice stretch of easy going weather. No need for heavy jackets, hats, scarfs, mittens, boots, pocket warmers, cowls. Where is the cold, I mean really cold, weather, the heavy snows, the blizzards and white outs, the icy pavements?

And then it dawns on me. I must be nuts. Am I seriously wishing to be miserable all winter? What's wrong with me. I think the reason we like nasty weather is because it gives us something to complain about. And that makes us happy.

So I'm going to change my attitude. I'm happy that it's been in the 40s-60s so far this winter. I'm happy the dog's water bowl doesn't freeze solid during

the day. I'm happy I don't have to shovel (yesterday's minimal snowfall doesn't count and today's sun will melt that snow-it's supposed to be 51 today). Other than the day the semis blew over, the wind hasn't been horrible. And I'm happy I don't have to bundle up like Ralphie's little brother in A Christmas Story.

I mean it's great. Really...... great. The long range forecast says mild through March. Wonderful. I'm so excited. If I keep telling myself this, it might work. I can be happy about this.

It's either that or we're just going to have to find something else to talk and complain about. Otherwise we're just not going to be happy. All winter.

## **Nolting Longarm Machines**

Nolting has 5 main machines, each with different reaches: from 17" to 30" depending on the machine. They are sold with or without a frame, but after I saw & helped set up one of the steel frames this week, I recommend buying the frame. All machines, except for the Standard-the most economical machine-- have a stitch regulator. I recommend a stitch regulator. All machines can be equipped with a computer and there are a couple of different ones to choose from. In addition, you can get an extended table base so that you can use rulers, you can get larger bobbins on some of the models and on the frames you can get hydraulic lifts to raise and lower the tables. In the coming weeks, I will print out more information on each model.

The best entry level machine is the Fun Quilter. It comes in 17", 20" & 23" reach. It comes with the Intellistitch Equalizer stitch regulator, standard speed control, needle up/down, and fixed handles in the front & rear. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.

The Pro Machine has the Intellistitch Turbo stitch regulator, single stitch option, standard speed control, needle up/down and customizable

handles in the front & rear. The Pro Machine comes in 20", 24" and 30" reach with 10-12" of inside height. There are easy dials on the front to set stitch length and other options. This machine can also



be equipped with a computer.

The NV Machine is the newest in the fleet of Nolting machines. This

machine has a touch screen with progra

mmable stitch regulation. You can stitch in 4 different stitch modes plus single stitch and needleup/down. It also has an adjustable brightness LED work light. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.





The Bali Wedding Star is a Judy Niemeyer foundation paper-pieced pattern, but Angela and Tina have simplified the color selections. In class you will learn the basics of foundation piecing, plus you will learn how to deal with those curves-really easy, don't worry. The first class will discuss color selection, cutting and organization. The remaining classes will focus on sewing and completion. Please sign up early because the background fabric requirements may require the ordering of specific bolts of fabric. Come in, choose colors you are interested in, and I will bring the bolts into the store.

### Binding Dec. 17 1-4, \$20

First half of class I'll demo choosing a binding, cutting & ironing the binding, trimming the quilt and stitching the binding down. I'll talk about alternate ways to put on bindings Second half of class, you will cut and apply your own binding to a small quilt. For this part of the class you will need a small quilted quilt. It can be anything, a panel, a pillow, something in 3 layers (back, batt, top) with some quilting holding the layers together.
