End of Year 40% off Sale PLEASE READ CAREFULLY BECAUSE THE RULES HAVE CHANGED

Great News! We will still have our end of year sale, **but things will be different. There will be rules and restricted access and tickets to get in.** Please read carefully, because I will abide by the rules I have set. This is the only way I can feel comfortable about holding the year end sale. My choices were trying to figure out how to limit traffic, cancel entirely or hold the sale in July. And I didn't want to cancel or wait until July.

Because of the restricted access to the sale, I am holding the sale for a two week period, rather than just a day and a half, so that everyone who wants to come will have an opportunity. And you get to choose your sale date(s).

Part One:

Between December 7-19 you must buy one item from the store to get your Wyoming Wind Express Ticket. This ticket will get you into the year end sale on your chosen date and time. I will have time slots from 10-1 and 1-4 each day, 8 customers per slot. (More about this below)

For the sale, I will restrict the number of customers in the store at any one time. And I will restrict how long you can spend in the store (don't worry, you can get up to 3 hours, should be plenty of time). If you want to come on several different days, you can get additional tickets, but...you have to **come back** to the store between December 7-19 and buy something else. Two different sales for 2 different tickets.

Sound complicated? Not really. For each sale between Dec 7-19 you can get a ticket. You get to select your time and date to come for the year end sale. This means, you need to know what day you want to come for the big sale. If you are eager to be first (on Dec. 20 if you are a Toad Toter) then be sure to be here on Dec. 7 to get your ticket and time slot. The first 12 to sign up will also receive a small gift. If you have to change your date after you have chosen it, that's okay. Just call and I'll let you know what other times and dates are available.

Part Two:

If you are a Toad Toter or if you have a Keep Smiling (covid) t-shirt, your sale dates are between December 20-23.

For everyone else, including Toad Toters, the sale will be between December 26-31.

General Notes:

If you are a Toad Toter, you must **either wear or bring your tote bag with you to the sale and bring your ticket**. When you pick up the ticket, if you tell me you have a tote bag or t-shirt that's all I need in order to assign you a time & date. But in order to get into the store for the 40% off sale during Dec 20-23, you **MUST** have your tote bag or wear your t-shirt and have your ticket.

If you are not a Toad Toter, your sale will start on December 26. You must bring your ticket with you on your chosen date and time in order to get the 40% sale price.

I am not advertising this sale in the Traders in order to keep the general traffic down. I will allow other customers into the store (but they can't buy at sale prices without a ticket), so long as there are no more than 8 people in the store at one time. Keep that in mind-if you intend to bring family, they must have a ticket unless there are not more than 8 in the store at one time. If you want to guarantee that family or friends can get in with you, make sure they buy something between Dec 7-19 and get a ticket and assigned to your same time slot.

The only way to get the 40% sale price is to have a ticket. If you want to shop more than one day, you need additional tickets.

You must wear a mask.

Please use hand sanitizer both before you enter the shop and when you leave-carry your own supply in the car.

Please stay 6 feet from other customers in the store as much as you can. We have tight aisles so please be patient and try to stay distanced.

Please don't come to the store if you believe you have been exposed to covid-19, have been to any gatherings that are larger than they should be, or if you have traveled during the Christmas holidays.

And I will apologize for being so rigid, but this disease is spreading rapidly and easily and I don't want this sale to contribute to the escalation. I want you to feel safe in the store and I want you to have a good time. And I also want to protect my staff.

I love this year end sale because I get to see a lot of happy, creative people having fun. So I hope I still get to see all of you, but just over a longer period of time.

Thanks for being understanding.



NOTE: Block of the month will be held tomorrow and I think we can do it outside again, if it's not windy. If you have finished your quilt, bring for show and tell. We will give you a ticket for a drawing to win free quilting--you do the quilting on the long arm machine at the shop. We won't draw until January, so you still have a month to get your quilt top done.


"In a Becca motel," Becca said trotting back inside. "You could build a model of me out by the road, and run a B&B for tourists," she said. "I'll even wash the towels."


"Becca, you're not even tall enough to reach to controls."

Block of the Month First Sat of month 10:30-11:15 FREE Barb Boyer Join at any time. You get a free fat quarter if you come to class with the previous month's completed block. This year the challenge is to use polka dot fabric in each block. The quilt will be whimsical, and will lend itself to bright colors, stripes, stars, and dots. To start you off we will give you a fat quarter that you must use in your blocks use (at least in some of them). But...if you don=t like the fat quarter or dots, you can choose any color scheme you like.

Hand Embroidery Club2nd Sat. of the month, 10-noon FREE Kathy Sconce If you want to learn to hand embroider or just brush up your technique, join us on the second Saturday of the month from 10 to noon. You can work on your own projects or you can join the project we are doing. We are still doing the Gardner=s Alphabet Quilt Block of the Month by Crabapple Hill. We will explore a variety of embroidery stitches for each block each block (2 letters per month), plus we will learn how to color with regular crayons to enhance the blocks. Nolting Longarm Machines

Nolting has 5 main machines, each with different reaches: from 17" to 30" depending on the machine. They are sold with or without a frame, but after I saw & helped set up one of the steel frames this week, I recommend buying the frame. All machines, except for the Standard--the most economical machine-- have a stitch regulator. I recommend a stitch regulator. All machines can be equipped with a computer and there are a couple of different ones to choose from. In addition, you can get an extended table base so that you can use rulers, you can get larger bobbins on some of the models and on the frames you can get hydraulic lifts to raise and lower the tables. In the coming weeks, I will print out more information on each model.

The best entry level machine is the Fun Quilter. It comes in 17", 20" & 23" reach. It comes with the Intellistitch Equalizer stitch regulator, standard speed control, needle up/down, and fixed handles in the front & rear. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.



The Pro Machine has the Intellistitch Turbo stitch regulator, single stitch option, standard speed control, needle up/down and customizable

handles in the front & rear. The Pro Machine comes in 20", 24" and 30" reach with 10-12" of inside height. There are easy dials on the front to set stitch length and other options. This machine can also



be equipped with a computer.

The NV Machine is the newest in the fleet of Nolting machines. This machine has a touch screen with progra

mmable stitch regulation. You can stitch in 4 different stitch modes plus single stitch and needleup/down. It also has an adjustable brightness LED work light. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.



Nolting also has a commercial machine with the Intellistitch Equalizer

stitch regulator, standard speed control, needle up/down, and fixed handles in the front & rear. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.

Normal Shop Hours: Monday-Saturday 10-5 Sunday 1-5 Closed first Sunday of month (and some holidays)

Join the fun and come feel the difference of quality fabrics.
