July 2, 2021

We are now living in the Jetson's generation.

If you remember the 1962 Jetson's cartoon that was set in 2062, it had

all sorts of cool futuristic things, many of which we are using today, 40 years ahead of schedule. Like video calls we've named Zoom; robotic vacuums we call Roomba; tablet computers we call IPads; Rosie the robotic maid, which are now sold by YellRobot; smart watches which are sold by Apple and Fitbit; drones; holograms or what we call virtual reality goggles; 3-D printed food, which we've got and more; pillcams as in swallow a pill with a camcorder to spy out your digestive tract; jet packs; moving sidewalks; flat screen tvs and, wait for it...

Flying cars! No lie!

Now to be honest, we've had "flying cars" for a while. They're called helicopters. Well, they are a little more than a helicopter, or a little different from a helicopter. They have vertical take offs and vertical landings. But once you're on the ground, that's it. No car transformation. You gotta take an Uber if you want to go anywhere other than the airport.

Until now. The Jetson styled car is called an AirCar and it's made in Slovakia. I had to look it up, too. It's in Europe, not far from Vienna, and it's surrounded by Hungary, Poland, and the Czech Republic. So far the AirCar has flown between 2 airports in Slovakia, then transforms into a car and drives off. The wings and tail tuck in, and in about 3 minutes, voila! you've got a car!

This flying car is relatively small, has a fixed-pitch propeller, which basically means it's fixed in place (don't send letters, I looked it up and it will take way too long to describe, suffice it to say it's a very basic Orville/Wilbur kind of thing), it can fly up to 8200 feet, goes about 105 mph, and can bank and turn, which is always helpful when nearing an airport. It also carries a parachute, just in case.

The designer, Stefan Klein, had been working on this for about 30 years and has logged 40 hours of air time. He's now working on a bigger horsepower engine with a variable-pitch propellor (it can do more things), that can fly 185 mph, travel 600 miles and when it lands it will be street legal, meaning it can legally drive around Europe.

I'm not sure I'm ready for aircars. I'm ready for electric cars, especially that new Ford F-150 all electric truck that can power my house during a snowstorm, cook my breakfast, saw down my dead trees and pull a train with 10 rail cars loaded with 42 F-150s with a combined weight of more than a million pounds.

In other odd and exciting news, a guy (he's a herpetologist, which means he studies lizards) finally found a nest of one of the largest living lizards in the world-a monster that can reach 5 feet in length and weighs -- well, I couldn't find out how much one weighs. I looked at several

different sites and they all gave me length but no weight. I'm betting they weigh a lot.

Anyway, this guy, named Sean Doody, decided to stick his hand down a hole, hoping to find the monitor lizard's eggs. We all know this is not a wise thing to do. But the problem with trying to locate the lizard's eggs was that every time researchers reached into a nest, "They'd get up to their shoulder and hit a dead end," Doody said.

But when Doody reached this inevitable dead end, with about half his body shoved into the tunnel, he decided to switch out his shovel for a spoon and keep digging. I mean, why not? And he found that the lizard had created a kind of back fill. He soon discovered that tunnel began to corkscrew down and down and down, about five feet. Quilt Challenge winners!



Nolting Longarm Machines

Nolting has 5 main machines, each with different reaches: from 17" to 30" depending on the machine. They are sold with or without a frame, but after I saw & helped set up one of the steel frames this week, I recommend buying the frame. All machines, except for the Standard-

the most economical machine-- have a stitch regulator. I recommend a stitch regulator. All machines can be equipped with a computer and there are a couple of different ones to choose from. In addition, you can get an extended table base so that you can use rulers, you can get larger bobbins on some of the models and on the frames you can get hydraulic lifts to raise and lower the tables. In the coming weeks, I will print out more information on each model.

The best entry level machine is the Fun Quilter. It comes in 17", 20" & 23" reach. It comes with the Intellistitch Equalizer stitch regulator, standard speed control, needle up/down, and fixed handles in the front & rear. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.

The Pro Machine has the Intellistitch Turbo stitch regulator, single stitch option, standard speed control, needle up/down and customizable

handles in the front & rear. The Pro Machine comes in 20", 24" and 30" reach with 10-12" of inside height. There are easy dials on the front to set stitch length and other options. This machine can also



be equipped with a computer.

The NV Machine is the newest in the fleet of Nolting machines. This

mmable stitch regulation. You can stitch in 4 different stitch modes plus single stitch and needleup/down. It also has an adjustable brightness LED work light. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.



Nolting also has a commercial machine with the Intellistitch Equalizer stitch regulator, standard speed control, needle up/down, and fixed handles in the front & rear. This machine can also be equipped with a computer.
