Never underestimate that gray haired, little old lady, sitting off by herself, calmly knitting. We learned that long ago from Agatha Christie's Miss Marple, who would knit through jury trials and murder investigations, and yet in the end be the only person smart enough to solve the case. But we tend to forget that when we see a knitter or a quilter. Someone picks up a pair of needles and her IQ begins to drop.

So I didn't quite know what to expect on my Craft Cruises Knitting tour to Antarctica. Miss Marples or sweet gray-haired grandmothers. I figured most of the knitters would have been knitting longer than I have, and for the most part that was true. But I wasn't expecting lawyers, accountants, professors, teachers, medical professionals, psychologists....an incredible array of talent and skills, all packaged into out going, infectious, secure and engaging women. We did have a few husbands along on the trip, who were as delightful as their counterparts.

I was on a Holland America ship called the Oosterdam. The ship can house 1964 guests plus crew. Our group consisted of 28 knitters, all women, some old, some not,

some gray haired, some not, some little, some not. And I can tell you I have never met a more delightful, educated, talented, well traveled and caring group of women in my life. Okay, that's a bit of an exaggeration, because I meet talented women, and men, all the time through the quilt store. But I was surprised, and in reality, I should not have been.

But all of us who participate in fiber arts activities experience that IQ point drop when we tell people we quilt or when we whip out our knitting needles. One woman on board the ship, who saw us knitting on the Lido deck, was delighted to see us knitting and confessed that she had brought some knitting along, but her friends were rather aghast that she might dare bring out her needles in public. We told her to join us anytime she wanted, because as we all know, there is safety in numbers.

Our tour leader was Dr. Kim Sullivan, a recently retired biology professor at Utah State University. She taught us about the wildlife we saw, from birds to whales to sea lions to....PENQUINS! Because, of course, one of the main purposes of this trip was to see PENQUINS! And we saw lots of them. Thousands. Hundreds of thousands. Seriously.

Our knitting teacher was Alissa Barton, the Knitting Fairy. On days at seas, we attended knitting classes, and in the afternoon and evenings we gathered to just sit and knit and watch the world, or ocean, go by. Our repair class was heart attack city, when we dropped all of our stitches just to learn how to pick them back up, and when we cut into our cables to slip an errant front cable to the rear. We learned new cast on and bind off techniques, got measurements for sweaters to adapt the sweater to our body and not the other way around. We practiced stitching parts back together, tried helix knitting, and learned why brioche isn't as hard as it really is. Although I'm still not convinced. Alissa was patient, easy to follow, and talented, oh my talented. She was inclusive to all of us and made sure no one was left out or left behind.

For the next several newsletters, I will tell you tales of Antarctica. I will also learn how to spell it (I leave the first c out when I type. Sigh.)

But first...any trip begins and ends a bit chaotically. My shuttle transport to the Denver airport changed my pick up time three times in 2 hours, the night before departure, going from 8 a.m. (original) to 6 a.m. to 9 a.m. (which meant I would miss my plane) to 4 a.m. My coming home trip got waylaid by a medical emergency that took us back to Chile 4 hours into our flight. To say that LATAM airline mishandled the resulting chaos and confusion that results in such an event doesn't even begin to describe the incompetence we faced. And then, finally getting home at 1:30 a.m., I found my mailbox head sitting on the ground next to its post. Turns out, somebody shot it. I'll admit that the head was barely staying on the post, but that was no reason to kill it. But that wasn't the final issue that greeted me. In the morning, heading to teach my quilt class, I discovered my car battery had died. Like my brother told me, "Don't you just love vacations!"

But despite the getting there and getting back woes, I'd do it again just to see Antarctica.

Our trip started in Buenos Aires, and because our rooms were not ready when we got to the hotel, we went exploring. A group of us headed to El Ateneo Grand Splendid, a famous bookstore that was formerly the Teatro Grand Splendid theater, dating back to 1919. In 2019, it was named the "world's most beautiful bookstore" by National Geographic. The stage had been turned into a café, and at the top of the hour, digital displays played out on the backdrop of the stage.

The next day we took a tour of the city. I saw lots of cultural highlights, got drenched in a rain storm, because of course my rain poncho and hat were still packed, saw lots of green Monk parrots, and strolled around the Recoleta cemetery were Eva Peron is buried. This is not a cemetery of headstones. It is a maze of more than 6,400 statues, sarcophagi, coffins and crypts. There are no street signs, no "you are here" diagrams, although you can get a map at the entrance. The description on the website says, "Lose yourself for hours in this labyrinthine city of the dead."

Our hotel was also hosting a famous local football (soccer) team. I only know this because there were all these kids in soccer uniforms standing behind a roped off section in the hotel. I figured they were waiting to get rooms. Nope. Just as I ducked under the ropes to head to the elevators, the elevators opened and young men piled

out, dressed as soccer players. Camera phones started clicking. I walked right through the players, thinking they were part of the group of kids. Nope. My picture is probably on some soccer fan web page somewhere, a clueless tourist photobombing famous players.

We also went to yarn shops. But that will be next week's story. As always when I come back from a trip, I write about my travels, in part to remind me what I did, in part to write for my fellow travelers, and in part to include you in my adventures. So stay tuned.

Yardage needed for a 61" X 70" is app. 2-3 yards of the focus fabric for the center squares, 1 ½ for the stars and 1 yard for the 4-patch squares. Border app. 2 yards.

Pattern Merry, Merry Snowmen by Bunny Hill Designs. The applique in the sample quilt is done with wool. We will teach both wool options, traditional needle turn or or finished edge applique, or raw edge applique. Skill level: Confident beginner
