Buying yarn in a foreign country can be challenging. In the US, we get our yarn all nicely packaged, with labels explaining the weight, yardage, suggested needles and gauge. And we still can't figure out how much yarn we need for a project.

But in Argentina and Chile, yarn was generally sold by weight, which meant the skein had to be weighed in order to find out how much there was, before it was priced. And it wasn't always labeled by type: worsted vs fingering, for example. I didn't actually care about any of that. My philosophy was: I'm here, I won't be back anytime soon, I want a



souvenir. On the Falkland Islands a regular tourist (not a knitter) asked how much the yarn cost—as in, was it expensive -- and I told her I had no clue how much my

purchase was. I just wanted Falkland wool. But I did care about getting enough for a project.

So my way of figuring this out was....I picked up a skein, if it looked large enough, one skein would make a hat. If I wanted 2 colors in the hat, I bought another skein. So that plan worked....to a point. I kept debating with myself as to whether I wanted a sweater quantity of yarn. For my shape, that typically means anywhere from 1500 yards to 1900 yards, depending on all sorts of things, or about 8 or 9 skeins, depending on all sorts of things. And I always buy extra just in case, because if I have left overs, I can make a matching hat and mittens.

The problem was, how many yarn stores am I going to visit and how to get all of this home. To jump to the end of the story, I bought another suitcase. The nice thing about yarn, though, it is reasonably light weight so a suitcase full of yarn won't tip the scales past 50 pounds.

So the first yarn store in Buenos Aires was Lanas Naturales. We were at the end of the city tour, had only 45 minutes or so and more than one store to visit. Yeah, that's gonna work. You bethcha. I found some lovely wool and mohair skeins that would work up into a nice??? Haven't figured that one out yet. But she also had a wide variety of embroidery floss and specialty threads that I snatched up as well.

The second yard store I could only walk in and walk out because I had only 5 minutes left before getting back on the bus. Probably just as well. She had nice yarn, too, in lots of natural colors and while I didn't have a quota on how much yarn I could buy on any one day, I probably would have exceeded my limit. If I had one.

Our second yarn excursion was in Montevideo, Uruguay. This trip combined yarn shopping in the morning, with lunch and wine tasting in the afternoon. And it's probably a good thing it was in that order.

Our first yarn shop was Balitex Lanas. Lanas, btw, means yarn. Balitex is essentially an outlet store. I found some yarns hand dyed in Uruguay from Araucania. These yarns were the first I used to make a hat while on board. Next up was Manos del Uruguay.

Manos del Uruguay started in 1968 to help improve the quality of life of Uruguay's rural women. Manos has 12 cooperatives, each located in a small village in Uruguay. Manos is a non profit organization, and is owned by the artisans. Profits are shared or reinvested. Manos has also been a member of the WFTO, World Fair Trade Organization, since 2009.


Manos' purpose is to give these women jobs, from making yarns, garments and other handcrafts. The yarns are hand dyed in small batches, using big pots heated by wood kettles. No two skeins are the same. The garments have a tag with the artisan's signature and the name of the village where the cooperative is located.

The shop was small and we had to split into 2 groups to shop. I may have been fortunate to be in the first group, because I spied a lovely colorful woven poncho that demanded I buy it. Every now and then on vacations, you find something special that if you don't buy it, you'll remember the loss forever. And two other knitters felt the same way. Three of us supported a local weaver that day. And more lovely yarn found its way into my bag. One of the skeins has now become a cowl.

Puerto Madryn was our next port with yarn shops, although on this stop we did not have an organized group tour for yarn hunting. Instead a small group of us walked and hunted. We did find a couple of shops, but the selections were not impressive. Because it is summer in Argentina, these local yarn shops did not have a lot of wool yarn for sale. I did find a couple of small skeins in a black/white and gray/white mix that I think will become marvelous mittens. Inside the port authority building, some local artisans had set up booths showcasing their crafts, including yarn projects. I bought a cute felted penguin, wearing a knitted hat. The Falkland Islands was our next port. The Falkland Islands produces a lot of wool and most of the sheep farmers are part of a coop called the Falkland Islands Wool Company. There are about 500k sheep on the islands which produce about 1,642,000 kgs of wool. Each year members of the coop come together and, essentially, pool their fleeces. Consequently, each year the fiber content will change slightly depending on the blend. Falkland wool has the reputation for being some of the finest wool produced and the farmers work at producing/breeding the finest fleece/wool possible.

We had a special trip for our group on the Islands. We visited Bluff Cove Farm and penguin rockery. Hattie Kilmartin runs the farm and produces her own yarns, independent of the coop. She sells hand dyed and hand spun yarns, including a new variety of tweed. I bought plain white (natural) plus several tweeds, which I'm using to make my Antarctica (still can't spell it) scarf. The natural white represents icebergs, glaciers and ice shelves. The tweedy blue/brown/gray represents the land masses and the sea, the natural gray represents fog, sky and land, and for a splash of color, the tweedy pink/gray/aqua blue represents the water, icebergs, land and....PENGUIN poop! That's the pink. Penguins eat krill which come out the other end as pink.

I have two more yarn shops to tell you about.....next time.
